



When Barrington taxpayers pay their property tax bill, only 9% of their bill goes to the Village. The Village focuses on using these resources efficiently and is able to use that 9%, combined with other revenue sources, to provide a wide variety of services, including police protection, fire protection, street and sidewalk maintenance, building and property maintenance, economic development, forestry services, and infrastructure improvements.

Help Us Plan for the Future

In both good and challenging times, every community must be actively engaged in planning for the future. Here at the Village of Barrington, we are doing just that. This summer and fall, we will be undergoing an update of our Comprehensive Plan, which is updated every 10 years. The last update was in 2000.

With the help of our citizens, our goal is to establish strategies that will fulfill the consensus vision for the Village. The new plan will cover topics as extensive as municipal boundaries, intergovernmental agreements, land use, Village Center, housing, transportation, the environment, and economic development.

Active community participation is key to developing a successful plan, and I encourage all residents, property owners, and business owners to get involved. A series of eight neighborhood meetings are taking place during the summer of 2010. The neighborhood meetings will provide our residents and businesses the opportunity to review the recommendations of the existing Comprehensive Plan, discuss current opportunities and concerns, and make recommendations for future plans in their specific neighborhood and throughout the Village. Members of the Village Board of Trustees and the Plan Commission, as well as staff from the Departments of Community and Economic Development and Engineering and Building, will facilitate the meetings.



Developer Chosen for the Corner of Hough & Main Streets

The Village is one step closer to redevelopment at the corner of Hough and Main Streets in the Village Center. After a lengthy and comprehensive selection process, the Village Board of Trustees on May 20 approved New Trier Partners, LLC as the preferred developer for the "Hough-Main Redevelopment Project." New Trier Partners envisions a mixed-use project that will feature high-end retail and limited residential space.

"This is an exciting time for the Village, and we feel fortunate that New Trier Partners is interested in helping the Village achieve our goal to create an exciting market-driven project that will add to the vibrancy of the Village Center," said Beth Raseman, Village Trustee and Chair of the Planning, Zoning, and Economic Development Committee.

Bob Goldstein, Managing Partner at New Trier Partners, added, "It is important to this company, as to the residents of Barrington, that

this project be both progressive and economically stimulating for the Village, but also to stay true to the unique architectural design and history of the community."

The Village and New Trier Partners will begin working on the development process, conceptual design, and development agreement to move the project forward. Village News You Can Use

Canadian National Update

In response to the Surface Transportation Board's (STB) investigation of CN's under-reporting of grade crossing delays on the EJ&E rail line, the TRAC Coalition has submitted comments to the STB urging it to penalize the railroad for misleading the agency and the public on this critical safety issue. In these comments, TRAC points out that this is not the only issue on which CN has failed to be wholly truthful.

In the comments that were filed on May 28, 2010, TRAC made the following points as a part of its case:

- The record shows that CN's reporting on the issue had been a willful effort to mislead the STB and flout the agency's known interests in monitoring all blockages of railroad crossings that exceed 10 minutes in duration;
- The blockage issue isn't the only issue in which CN has been misleading, and that CN has a record of picking and choosing what it tells Congress and shares with the STB at any given stage both pre- and post-transaction approval.

Please allow two full working days prior to the beginning of your project for utility company representatives to mark the dig site.



Dog Tags Are Due July 1

What are the most popular dog names in the Village? Cooper, Maggie, Molly, Max and Dolly. How do we know? Their owners bought Village dog tags for them. These tags are only \$5 and can mean the difference between losing your dog and the Police Department returning your dog safely to you. Dog tags are available at the Village Hall or online at www.barrington-il.gov, and are effective from July 1 through June 30. If a dog is found without a tag, its owner can be charged a minimum of \$25 for the first offense. Also, please remember that the Village of Barrington has a leash law and an animal waste ordinance. When your pet is on any premises other than its owner's, it must be on a leash of no more than six feet. Please be respectful of your community and clean up after your pet. Rain, Rain, and More Rain

As most of our residents are aware, two significant rain events occurred in May that caused widespread flooding in the Village. At the Village's low point near Miller Park at Lincoln & Summit Streets (sub-area 3), the flooding was magnified by a discharge of the sanitary sewer due to an overflow of stormwater pouring into the sanitary sewer system.

The Village takes all flooding issues very seriously, and we understand how inconvenient and costly such events can be. For the past year, consultants Hey & Associates have been working on an in-depth Global Stormwater Management study to help the Village identify ways to mitigate flash flooding. This spring, the group presented its report to the Village, which is currently under review by the Board of Trustees.

To address the immediate issues, Village staff is investigating the most recent flooding events, which we believe are caused in part by an overload of stormwater pouring into the sanitary system. We are using camera inspections of the of the sanitary sewer system to view the condition of the sewers and have been lining damaged portions; we will also begin using smoke testing throughout the Village to help determine undiscovered sources of stormwater entering the sanitary sewer system.

We believe that a root cause may be improper connections from business or residential downspouts or sump pumps to the sanitary pipes. This improper, additional inflow of stormwater into the sanitary system can often cause too much stormwater to flood the sanitary system, causing problems for neighbors "downstream." We understand that many businesses or residents may not be aware of the improper connection, and we will inform residents and business owners individually if this is discovered during our investigation into this serious problem.

On a much lighter note, in May the Village of Barrington took a strong team of staff and Trustees to the ICSC, the nation's leading annual convention of retailers, developers, and municipalities. We met with business representatives to line up economic development opportunities for the upcoming year and made several strong connections that will help us further our mission of creating a more vibrant Barrington.

As Barrington's "Best Summer Ever" continues and everyone is out and about strolling Village streets and enjoying time with family and friends, I hope you will continue to find new and exciting places to shop, dine, and enjoy in our Village. Every day, your Village staff and Trustees are working hard to make Barrington an exceptional place to "live, work, and play." Have a great summer!

Lawn Fertilizing: Be Kind to the Environment

Although we hope you're only fertilizing your lawn when absolutely necessary, you can decrease environmental damage by using phosphorus-free fertilizer. (The three numbers on the fertilizer bag designate nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium, so look for a product with a zero as the middle number.)

Phosphorus is plentiful in our soils, so that adding more is unnecessary. More importantly, phosphorus pollutes our lakes and streams. It fertilizes aquatic plants causing algae blooms that are unsightly and that kill fish and other aquatic organisms. Phosphorus-free fertilizer is available from more and more garden centers and landscapers. Please inquire about it, and shop with the environment in mind.

Village Addresses May Flooding Events

In May, two storms caused flooding of several streets and basements and an overload of our sewage treatment plant. The overload was caused by stormwater entering our sanitary sewer system.

As a condition of operating our sanitary treatment plant, the Village is required to find and correct situations where stormwater enters our sanitary system. The next step in this process is "smoke testing." In this process, non-toxic smoke is introduced into the sanitary sewer system. By observing where the smoke escapes, stormwater connections to the sanitary sewer can be detected.

The Village has contracted with a company called Visu-Sewer to assist us in this process. Work in several areas of the Village has already begun. Residents in the areas where the smoke testing is being conducted are being notified with door hangers and flyers, and they will also be notified of improper connections discovered during smoke testing.

You can help by checking your downspouts and sump pump connections and ensuring that they are not connected to the sanitary sewer system. Public Works is available to assist you in making this determination.
