Village News You Can Use

Village Receives Grant for Radios

We are happy to report that the village was recently awarded a grant for over \$20,000 from the Department of Homeland Security. The funds will be used to purchase new base station radios for emergency Police and Fire. These radios need to be replaced due to FCC requirements that all municipal radio equipment be made "narrowband" compliant by 2013. The Village's emergency management team has been working steadily on this mandate, and will have all of our equipment fully compliant before the federal deadline.



Jim Wallace, the Village's Deputy Village Manager and Emergency Management Co-Coordinator, said, "due to the diligence of our team, we were able to take advantage of this grant opportunity, which came with very short notice. It's a good example of how hard our people work, usually behind the scenes, to stay at the cutting edge of emergency management."

Changes in Your Refuse Collection

As a part of its ongoing efforts to "go green", Groot, the Village's refuse and recycling contractor, is changing some of its collection routes, to be more efficient with its fuel use. The change goes into effect Friday, July 1. The net result for Village residents, other than having cleaner air to breathe, will be that some collections may be earlier in the morning.

Although Village regulations have always required residents to have containers out to the curb by 7:00 am, some of us have become accustomed to getting our containers out to the curb a little later, knowing that the route of the Groot trucks in our neighborhood may give us a little extra time. **So be ready—the new, more fuel-efficient routing may mean an earlier pick-up for you!** Making sure your containers are at the curb by 7:00 a.m. will avoid problems and help facilitate Groot's latest effort to get greener!

Your Refuse, Recycle & Yard Waste Collection Times may Change

Last year, Groot Industries provided Barrington with 10 Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) refuse trucks, which operate 80% cleaner than diesel. In an effort to continue improving operational effectiveness by reducing our carbon footprint, Groot is restructuring routes and collection times in Barrington. **WHILE YOUR SERVICE DAY IS NOT CHANGING**, the time that Groot is in your neighborhood for collection will most likely be changing. Therefore, it is very important that you have your refuse, recycling and yard waste material out for collection no later than 7:00 a.m. on your day of collection. This route restructuring will provide the following benefits:

Route Efficiencies: Restructuring the routes will reduce wasteful trips to area transfer stations.

Environmental: This greening of operations will reduce wasteful traffic on Barrington streets and further reduce harmful emissions.

Collection Tips to Remember:

- Refuse must be placed in designated carts.
- All recyclable items may be commingled in your recycle cart.
- Recycling carts do not have to be set-out every week - only when full.
- Avoid using plastic grocery bags - ask for paper & place newspaper inside.
- Return hangers to your dry cleaners.
- Do not place window glass, oil, paint or yard waste in recycle carts!

Village in Enviably Financial Position

In early June, the Village Board reviewed the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the year ended December 31, 2010 and a Five Year Financial Projection which is part of the 2012 annual budget process. The CAFR for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2010 presents the financial results from the Village's operations during 2010. The CAFR is prepared for the Village by its auditing firm and presents balance sheets and income statements for all of the Village's accounting funds.

The 2010 CAFR showed that the Village improved upon the positive financial results that occurred in 2009. In 2009, the Village's General Fund had a small surplus of \$1,497, leaving a Fund Balance of \$10,104,916 at the end of the year. In 2010, the General Fund generated a surplus of \$29,827, even after transferring \$650,000 to the Capital Improvement Fund for future infrastructure improvements. The General Fund had an ending total Fund Balance of \$10,134,743, including the equivalent of four months of expenditures in the Unassigned Fund Balance which can be used to pay for operational expenses. This is a very positive development as the General Fund improved its financial performance significantly when compared to 2009 and has now produced two years of surpluses despite the economic challenges in recent years.

The Village's other operating funds are also performing well. The TIF District Fund had a surplus of \$44,000 in 2010 and the three Enterprise Funds (Water & Sewer, Recycling & Refuse, and Parking System) had combined operating income of \$234,000.

In addition to the excellent performance in the Village's operational Funds, significant investments in the Village's infrastructure occurred in 2010. The Capital Improvement and Water & Sewer Funds combined expended \$3,127,000 in 2010 to reconstruct or repair the Village's street related infrastructure, including water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer mains as well as streets, curb and gutter, and sidewalks. In addition, the Village made significant improvements to its sanitary sewer treatment facilities in 2010.


The Five Year Financial Projection showed that the Village will be quite capable of continuing to provide the current level of municipal services while maintaining an adequate level of financial performance in the General Fund. The primary concern over the next five years will be the Village's ability to fund infrastructure maintenance and reconstruction projects. These projects are tremendously expensive and the Village's revenues have declined since the economic downturn began in late 2007, putting pressure on the ability to maintain an adequate level of spending on infrastructure.

In summary, the Village remains in an enviable financial position when compared to many other cities and villages and especially the State of Illinois. The Village responded rapidly to the economic events of 2008 by reducing its staff by 20% and making significant reduction in expenditures (General Fund 2008 expenditures were \$17,209,199, 2010 General Fund expenditures were \$14,965,882, a reduction of \$2,243,317 or 13.04%). These reductions combined with improving revenues have produced two years of surpluses in the General Fund and contributed to the generally healthy financial condition of the Village..

What Our Water's Worth

The waterways are for water. Lots of things that don't belong there end up in our waterways, streams, ponds, etc., such as litter, pharmaceuticals, fertilizers and detergents. Buy products with less packaging and fewer pollutants, then dispose of them properly.

Conserve water during storms. When it rains, stormwater flows into the sewer and can overwhelm the system, leading to flooding. Just before, during, and immediately after rain, limit your water use—don't water your lawn, wash your car, run the dishwasher, etc.—because those small actions contribute to overwhelming the sewer system.

Tell the State to protect people and wildlife. For the first time in almost 40 years, the State of Illinois is considering how to better protect both people that recreate and wildlife that live in and along Chicago's Rivers. Tell the State that you use and value these waterways, and that they need to act now to protect them for future generations.



What Our Water's Worth (WOWW) is a campaign from the Metropolitan Planning Council and Openlands, nonprofit organizations that have been working together since 2003 to protect and preserve water resources in northeastern Illinois and northwestern Indiana, are launching a multiyear communications campaign to raise awareness about the value of water in our region. This is our water - and it's worth more than we know.


