FAQ's About CN Operations

With CN traffic ramping up its operations on the EJ&E, the Village has been receiving questions about what can be done to ameliorate the detrimental impacts stemming from the increased number of freight trains running through our community. With freight traffic now running at about half of what CN has projected for the line (or about 12 of the 21 trains CN projected in its application), we thought we'd take the opportunity to respond to some of the questions we receive most frequently.

Can the number of trains CN runs on the EJ&E be limited?

This is an issue that the Village has examined closely. Unfortunately, no State or local governmental authority, including the Village, has the jurisdiction to regulate the number of trains that are operated by any railroad in interstate commerce. Only the Surface Transportation Board has exclusive jurisdiction over transportation by rail carriers and the remedies provided by federal law (in this case, the ICC Termination Act of 1995.) The remedies provided by that law do not include limiting the number of trains that are operated on a line of railroad in interstate commerce. Furthermore, the Board has never fashioned such a remedy under its inherent unenumerated powers to carry out the Interstate Commerce Act.

As a result of this existing legal authority, CN is empowered to run as many trains on the EJ&E as the line has the capacity to handle. Unfortunately, because the EJ&E line serves as CN's main bypass route around Chicago when it's transporting shipments that don't begin or end in the region, CN has made it clear to the Village that it will not limit its operations to benefit residents of Barrington or elsewhere.

Can the CN freight trains run on a schedule and can residents get that schedule to plan their travels through the Village (perhaps as a cell phone app)?

In discussions with the Village, CN has stated that it will not provide a schedule of its operations for both safety and operational reasons. CN's model of precision railroading means it tells its customers when it will show up within a time frame window. To the extent that its trains are delayed by weather-related slow orders or conflicts with other freight railroads, passenger, and commuter rail operations, CN will try to make up time in a train run and could have trains moving through the Village at any hour. While CN has an agreement with Metra to defer to commuter rail operations during morning and evening rush hours, it's not at all uncommon for the railroad to bookend those time frames with freight movement on the EJ&E that will impact subsequent vehicular traffic flow.

Can the Village make the trains speed up or slow down, or run at a consistent speed so that the noise from the trains isn't as jarring and loud?

Because Congress has enacted laws that preempt local regulations that would attempt to establish speed limits for trains, the Village has no ability to require CN to adjust the speeds at which it operates through the Village. According to a traffic analysis the Village did in 2011, the average speed of CN trains running through the Village is 32 mph. This is a bit slower than the 39 mph CN had projected in its purchase application. By Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) operating rules, CN trains can run at speeds as high as 45 mph on the EJ&E. It is important to remember, however, that there is a real trade off when it comes to train speeds. Faster trains can be louder, but they also move through more quickly, and thus block crossings for a shorter period of time.

Residents have noted that the trains are louder when they are slowing down or speeding up, and that this is particularly aggravating from a noise perspective. One of the reasons we frequently experience the acceleration and/or deceleration problem is that CN trains routinely stop near Cuba Marsh to await clearance from conflicting commuter rail traffic. It takes a freight train close to 2 miles to speed up after a dead stop or come to a complete halt from normal operating speeds, so we hear the noise levels associated with changes in speed quite frequently.

Can the Village get CN to run shorter trains?

Whether you're trying to catch your commuter train, get to an appointment on time, or trying to pick up or drop off your child at school, the clock is ticking as you sit in your car waiting for a long freight train to pass. While CN committed in its application to an average train length of 6,800 feet, that length is problematic in the Village as our four main rail-to-road grade crossings on the EJ&E are just 5,900 feet apart.

Congress has enacted legislation that prevents the Village from placing limits on the length of trains. As a result, we've found that it's a losing battle to seek shorter freight trains. In fact, CN told us as far back as November 2007, that it would always be the railroad's preference to add to a train's length rather than run additional trains as it's a more cost effective way for the railroad to manage its growth. In the last year, we have begun seeing some exceptionally long 10,000-foot CN trains running through the Village, and we know that CN is building sidings in Canada that can accommodate 12,000-foot (2 mile) long trains. Realistically, we can expect to see some of those longer trains running on the EJ&E – especially as the economy improves. This is one of the reasons that the Village is continuing the effort to have the STB order CN to pay a significant portion of the cost of a grade separation.

CN FAQ's Continued...

Question: Can the Village convince CN not to run hazmat cargo on the EJ&E?

All freight railroads are required by law to carry any and all legal cargo that a shipper wishes to transport by freight rail, so the shipment of hazardous materials on the EJ&E is a given. Compounding things, however, is a federal law that now requires railroads to ship hazmat cargo through metropolitan areas on the route that poses the "least overall risk." For security purposes, none of the railroads are required to share with local governments the routes they have selected to ship hazmat through the greater Chicagoland region, so we don't know the extent of CN's hazmat shipments on the EJ&E. Because of our concerns about hazmat, Barrington and the TRAC Coalition recently filed a petition before the federal Pipelines and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA) seeking a regulation that would require the retrofitting of the existing fleet of tank cars that carry ethanol and other explosive hazardous materials and have a higher rate of breaching in derailments. What else has the Village done about the CN/EJE situation?

Barrington has been a leader in advocating for local community interests vis-à-vis CN's purchase of the EJ&E for years exactly because the impacts on the Village are so profound. It's the reason that we sought and secured federal funding to explore the options for a grade separation where the EJ&E line crosses Northwest Highway. To better protect our community's residents, we've had our first responders attend hazmat response training in Pueblo, CO at CN's expense. We've aggressively worked with the Surface Transportation Board to get signs posted at all crossings to insure the public can call CN in an emergency situation. We also worked with CN to institute a quiet zone through the Village to minimize horn noise.

In addition, we've worked with TRAC to make sure the oversight of the transaction is going well and that the STB is getting the information and analysis it needs to determine whether its original mitigation decisions are working out as contemplated. In fact, it was TRAC's watchdog efforts that led to the discovery that CN was under-reporting blocked crossing instances. This month, we sent a letter to the STB outlining the flaws in the most recent audit report it released this June. That can also be viewed at the TRAC website at: <http://www.fightrailcongestion.com/>. Most importantly, we have requested the Board – based on post-acquisition CN operations – correct its erroneous pre-acquisition calculations as to traffic impacts in Barrington and direct CN to pay the lion's share of a grade separation in Barrington, just as the Board had awarded grade separations in Aurora and Lynwood.

The ramifications for the Village and its residents stemming from CN's purchase of the EJ&E have changed our community, but we will continue to seek avenues for redress of specific problems as they arise. As always, don't hesitate to share your concerns with the Village, but most importantly, make sure that you let the STB hear from you in real time by using the complaint mechanism on the TRAC website.
