## Winter Parking

**November 1<sup>st</sup> through March 31<sup>st</sup>**



To allow snow plows to safely maneuver and clean the streets for emergency response vehicles, parking is not permitted after 1:00 a.m. on streets within the Central Business District when snow accumulation is over two inches, until snow removal operations are complete. Parking is not permitted at any time on residential streets outside of the Central Business District when snow accumulation is two inches or more, until snow removal operations are complete. Just as a reminder, parking is always prohibited on all Village Streets between the hours of 1:00 A.M. until 6:00 A.M. Village snow removal crews typically complete post storm clean-up of Village streets during the hours of 1:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. after the storm has ended. Please refrain from parking on the street until after all snow and ice control efforts have been completed.

## Hough-Main Project Approved by Village Board

On December 17, 2012 the Village Board approved the unanimous recommendations of the Plan Commission and the Architectural Review Commission to develop the Barrington Center Project on the Village-owned property located at the corner of Hough and Main Streets. The developer for the project is AHC ERA HM, LLC a joint venture between Arthur Hill & Co. LLC and Envision Realty Advisors, LLC. Arthur Hill & Co. LLC is the sponsor of the AHC Funds. It is a privately held real estate firm, founded in 1993, with a focus on the investment, development and management of office, retail, residential and land projects in selected markets throughout the United States. They have teamed with Envision Realty Advisors to assist in the creation of this unique retail and office destination for Barrington.

The Plan Commission held public hearings on December 4 and December 11, 2012. After considering public comments and discussing the petition, the Plan Commission voted to send the Planned Unit Development to the Village Board with a unanimous 6-0 vote. The Planned Unit Development (PUD) allows for various exceptions from the Zoning Ordinance to enhance the overall design, layout and cohesiveness of the development. The PUD will allow a two story development with the option for a partial third story to the development, if market conditions warrant.

The Architectural Review Commission held three meetings with the Developer to review the overall appearance, materials and design of the building. The ARC voted unanimously with a 6-0 vote to send a positive recommendation to the Village Board with the approval of the two story structure with conditions, including the need to return to the ARC if the developer proceeds with the partial third story, and bringing other minor details back to the Commission to review as final details.

The Village has been working on the redevelopment of this site for several years and is very pleased with the proposed design, the developer and the advisors that will partner with the Village. The project will bring an attractive and functional mixed use development to the site, and will enhance the business community in Barrington.

The proposed project includes:

- Approximately 25,000 square feet of retail
- Approximately 20,000 to 31,000 square feet of commercial office space
- Amenities that feature outdoor dining areas, public plazas, bicycle facilities and wide sidewalks, making this a pedestrian friendly place
- 131 public parking spaces in the parking lot, owned by the Village, for use by customers in the central business district and another 20 public parking spaces to be constructed on Station Street.

Under a redevelopment agreement that was approved in March, 2012, the developer must abide by performance measures to ensure that the project moves forward in a timely manner. The RDA also provides for the developer to ground lease only that portion of the property on which the development is constructed for 99 years, referred to as the "Leased Parcel." The Developer has the right to purchase the Leased Parcel under the agreement at a value to be set at the time of exercise of this option. The Village will continue to own the land under the parking lot.

The Village is excited this project has the full support of the Plan Commission and the Architectural Review Commission. Unanimous support for an approved development plan sends a positive message to retailers and office tenants looking for space in Barrington. The developer is now actively pursuing leases for the development, securing financing and preparing the final development documents. The Village will provide updates on the status of the project in the future.

What's a rain garden and can it solve your water problems?

Rain gardens use native plants to create beautiful natural landscape features that require less maintenance and fewer chemicals than lawns. They are 50-300 sq. ft. shallow depressions that capture runoff from impervious areas such as roofs and pavement and allow it to seep slowly into the ground. This gets stormwater into the ground to replenish groundwater supplies instead of running across lawns and streets into a sewer or ditch that flows directly into Flint Creek or another waterbody. Once established, a rain garden can convert 15,000-30,000 gallons of stormwater runoff a year to groundwater, protecting Flint Creek by reducing stormwater runoff – and flooding – and filtering pollutants.

## Train Problems? Don't Just Fume - Take Action

As the CN traffic builds on the EJ&E line, we understand that resident frustrations are building as well. In August, about two-thirds of CN's overall projected traffic ran on the EJ&E. Across the greater Barrington area, we are hearing the complaints loud and clear about travel delays due to blocked crossings; freight running during peak commuter hours and gridlocking the roads; horn and wayside noise at all hours; and idling trains sitting for long hours.

Because we expect this traffic volume to ebb and flow in the months ahead, it's important that you know you have the power to register your complaints to the Surface Transportation Board during the oversight period for this rail merger. Don't waste the opportunity to tell federal regulators how CN operations are impacting the quality of life in our community.

If you are bothered by CN's operations, go to [www.FightRailCongestion.com](http://www.FightRailCongestion.com) and click onto the "Register Rail Complaint" icon on the home page. Add this website to your mobile devices, so the next time you are stalled in traffic watching a mile-long train crawl by and blocking traffic for more than 10 minutes, you can do more than just fume! Whether you are at home or in your car, it's important that the STB hears from us. Otherwise, they will conclude that things are running smoothly.



## Two Pedestrian Crosswalk Enhancements Completed

Two new Pedestrian Crosswalk Enhancements were recently completed at the intersections of Main Street and Hager Avenue and Main Street and Coldspring Road. These improvements were 100% funded with a grant from the Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program administered by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). The crossings were selected due to the high amount of pedestrian traffic and their strategic locations at the east and west entry points to the Village. While many other locations were considered, these sites balanced usefulness with other criteria required for approval by IDOT. These devices have gained tentative approval for trial use on IDOT roadways and are the first two sets of flashing pedestrian beacons to be installed within the Village.

The flashing pedestrian beacons are solar powered and are operated by pushing the button on the pole, much like a pedestrian walk signal at a traffic signal. When a pedestrian pushes the button, the yellow caution lights will flash for approximately 30 seconds alerting passing motorists to the pedestrians. If you are driving a vehicle and see these flashing yellow lights, please stop before entering the intersection and allow the pedestrians to cross the street. If you are a pedestrian, after pushing the button and the yellow flashing lights have been activated, please wait to enter the street until all traffic has stopped and then proceed across the street. As soon as all of the pedestrians have crossed the street, and there are no other pedestrians waiting to cross, the motorists may proceed through the intersection even if the yellow lights are still flashing.

These two locations will be monitored for effectiveness and usefulness to improve pedestrian safety. The Village continuously monitors grant opportunities available for these types of projects and is pleased to bring these improvements to the residents of the Village. In order to receive similar funding in the future we, as motorists and pedestrians, need to demonstrate that these devices have been useful and effective at these trial locations.
