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Stop for Pedestrians in Crosswalks



Property Tax Season

Residents of the Cook County portion of the Village recently received the first installment invoice for their 2012 property taxes. Financial information from the Village's 2011 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) is printed in the note section of this invoice. In this letter, I'd like to explain the numbers behind the information printed by the County for our Cook County residents and at the same time impart some financial information to our Lake County residents. The information presented by the County is not quite complete but we hope the following adds some clarity.

As reported by the County, the Village's total liabilities and debt equaled \$35,033,676 at the end of 2011 with external debt (bonds, notes, and loans) of \$27,258,912. However, it is impossible to assess the Village's financial position without also having information about the Village's assets. At the end of 2011, the Village had total assets of \$118,268,310 and current assets of \$35,139,226. The Village has a low debt to asset ratio of 23.05% which is indicative of a financially healthy organization that uses debt financing in a prudent manner. Most organizations are considered to be financially strong if their debt to asset ratio is less than 40%. The Village's strong debt to asset ratio is one of the reasons the Village maintains the second highest bond rating from both Standard & Poor's (AA+) and Moodys (Aa1).

Another important indicator of the Village's financial position is the relationship between its current assets and its total liabilities. At the end of 2011, the Village had \$35.1 million in current assets and \$35 million in total liabilities. The Village had the means to liquidate all of its outstanding debt and liabilities with its current assets.

The primary reason for issuing debt is to provide the financial resources needed for the reconstruction of existing infrastructure (water and sewer system, streets, facilities). These assets often have life expectancies of 20 to 75 years and financing through the sale of bonds makes sense so that all future users of the infrastructure are contributing to the costs. The Village has never issued debt except for the purchase, construction, or reconstruction of capital assets.

Although the information printed by the County about the Village's total debt and liabilities is accurate, the information does not illustrate the percent of the Village's outstanding debt that is supported by your property taxes. While many taxing bodies have to cover 100% of their debt through property taxes, the Village is not in that situation. Out of the \$27,258,912 in outstanding external debt at the end of 2011, only 17.11% (\$4,665,000) is directly paid by property taxes. The majority of the Village's debt is paid from alternate revenue sources such as water and sewer user charges.

Further, the Village continues to restructure its outstanding debt to take advantage of current interest rates and lower payment amounts. In 2009, the Village refinanced the General Obligation Bonds that were issued to build Village Hall and the Public Safety Building. This bond issue is the only bond issue that is paid directly from resident's property taxes. By refinancing in 2009, the Village lowered interest payments on those bonds and saved taxpayers an average of \$59,200 per year from 2010 through 2018, for a total savings of \$473,942. In 2012, the Village refinanced a significant portion of its outstanding TIF Debt Certificates and reduced the interest cost by \$577,000 through 2023. The debt service for these debt certificates is only paid from the TIF Increment received by the Village which comes from the incremental property taxes generated by development activity in the TIF District.

Water Main Replacement Commencing in April

The Village of Barrington is scheduled to replace the water main and storm sewer along Main Street from the Union Pacific/Metra Railroad to Spring Street with construction commencing in early March and lasting until the middle of June. The first stage of the project will include the placement of new water main and storm sewer within the Main Street pavement. This portion of the construction is scheduled to occur during the overnight hours in order to minimize traffic impacts and impacts to local businesses. All traffic lanes will be open from early morning (in order to accommodate commuter train traffic) through the end of the evening rush period. With this overnight work, there will be construction noise during the overnight shifts, which are expected to last approximately four weeks. The next stage of the work will be in the Village Parking Lots #5 and #10 located on both sides of the Railroad behind Catch Penny. This portion of the work will require the temporary closure of these parking lots. Village Receives Transportation Grant

On January 30th, Governor Quinn announced \$50 million of Illinois Transportation Enhancement Projects (ITEP) that were selected from the latest round of submittals. Of those submitted, only 16% of applications were approved, including the Village of Barrington's application for 80% funding of a multi-use trail. This trail will connect the existing Main Street sidewalk system near the southeast corner of the high school to the Field of Dreams entrance. The multi-use trail will run along the Main Street frontage, then north along Hart Road up to the Field of Dreams entrance. Ultimately, this path will also connect to the Hart Road intersection improvement multi-use trail which will run north along Hart Road from the Field of Dreams, across Route 14, up to Taylor Street and also east to the existing sidewalk at Cumnor Avenue. Once both of these sections are completed, this will tie together all three major connection points on the west end of the Village, creating a looped trail system. The High School creates tremendous pedestrian traffic and these improvements tie together a key link in Barrington's system as identified in the Barrington 2012 Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Plan. The ITEP grants are expected to take 2 to 3 years to get from design to completion. With the Hart Road intersection improvement planned for 2015 by Lake County, the timing of these projects should approximately align.

Village staff, along with the Bike & Pedestrian Committee, has worked diligently over the past several years to bring to fruition a pedestrian and bike friendly plan for the Village. We are happy to receive this grant and look forward to the completion of this project.

What's a rain garden and can it solve your water problems?

Rain gardens use native plants to create beautiful natural landscape features that require less maintenance and fewer chemicals than lawns. They are 50-300 sq. ft. shallow depressions that capture runoff from impervious areas such as roofs and pavement and allow it to seep slowly into the ground. This gets stormwater into the ground to replenish groundwater supplies instead of running across lawns and streets into a sewer or ditch that flows directly into Flint Creek or another waterbody. Once established, a rain garden can convert 15,000-30,000 gallons of stormwater runoff a year to groundwater, protecting Flint Creek by reducing stormwater runoff – and flooding – and filtering pollutants.

Property Tax Season Continued

The County also printed information about the Village's operating budget which unfortunately was incorrect. The Village's "gross operating budget" as printed on the Cook County property tax bills was \$26,235,145. The actual final 2011 Village operating budget as reported in the CAFR was \$21,075,712 which is a reduction of 32.5% from the operating budget of \$31,235,047 in 2008. In the previous three years the Village has reduced its workforce by 17.6% and reduced its operating expenditures each year to balance revenues and expenditures. The Village has managed to generate small surpluses in its operating funds in each of the last three years as a result of this expenditure discipline. In addition to the \$21,075,712 operating budget, the 2011 budget also included \$6,752,049 for capital expenditures on infrastructure improvements. The Village typically spends approximately 25% of its total budget on capital expenditures.

Finally, the County printed information about the Village's pension obligations including the total pension liability of \$51,713,849, the total unfunded pension liability of \$13,212,579, and the pension fund ratio of 74.45%. Unfortunately, pension costs are having a negative impact on the Village's finances. The Village Board and I have long been advocates for complete reform of the municipal pension systems. As you may know, the Village's pension obligations are dictated by the State Legislature. The Legislature sets the benefit and contribution levels for municipal pension plans and the Village has no legal authority to modify the plans. The Village as employer has always contributed 100% (and sometimes even greater) of the actuarially required contributions. We do not "kick the can down the road". Pension costs are taking more and more of the Village's available revenues each year. The Village's pension costs in 2008 were \$1,105,667; 4 years later, in 2013, the Village's pension costs will be \$1,801,925, a 62% increase in cost in four years. If pension costs had not increased almost \$700,000 in the prior 4 years, the Village could have used those funds for other purposes. The rapid escalation in pension costs is preventing the Village from improving its services or making additional infrastructure improvements.

If the State Legislature does not take immediate steps to overhaul the municipal pension plans, significant service reductions may need to take place to continue to meet our financial obligations without placing significant burdens on taxpayers.

The Village Board and I carefully weigh the impact our actions have on you as taxpayers. We have reduced our operating expenditures by 32.5% in the last four years and have balanced the budget in each of those years. We've lowered your property taxes by refinancing existing bonds to reduce interest payments which directly lowers your property tax bill. We've been aggressively pursuing economic development to boost sales tax revenue and keep property taxes as low as possible while continuing to provide excellent municipal services.

Train Problems? Don't Just Fume - Take Action

As the CN traffic builds on the EJ&E line, we understand that resident frustrations are building as well. In August, about two-thirds of CN's overall projected traffic ran on the EJ&E. Across the greater Barrington area, we are hearing the complaints loud and clear about travel delays due to blocked crossings; freight running during peak commuter hours and grid-locking the roads; horn and wayside noise at all hours; and idling trains sitting for long hours.

Because we expect this traffic volume to ebb and flow in the months ahead, it's important that you know you have the power to register your complaints to the Surface Transportation Board during the oversight period for this rail merger. Don't waste the opportunity to tell federal regulators how CN operations are impacting the quality of life in our community.

If you are bothered by CN's operations, go to www.FightRailCongestion.com and click onto the "Register Rail Complaint" icon on the home page. Add this website to your mobile devices, so the next time you are stalled in traffic watching a mile-long train crawl by and blocking traffic for more than 10 minutes, you can do more than just fume! Whether you are at home or in your car, it's important that the STB hears from us. Otherwise, they will conclude that things are running smoothly.



To allow snow plows to safely maneuver and clean the streets for emergency response vehicles, parking is not permitted after 1:00 a.m. on streets within the Central Business District when snow accumulation is over two inches, until snow removal operations are complete. Parking is not permitted at any time on residential streets outside of the Central Business District when snow accumulation is two inches or more, until snow removal operations are complete. Just as a reminder, parking is always prohibited on all Village Streets between the hours of 1:00 A.M. until 6:00 A.M. Village snow removal crews typically complete post storm clean-up of Village streets during the hours of 1:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. after the storm has ended. Please refrain from parking on the street until after all snow and ice control efforts have been completed.
