Village Report

Barrington Celebrates 150 Years!

In 2010, the Village Board voted to appoint community leaders to a committee that began planning events and activities for the Village's 150th anniversary. It's finally here and things are about to get exciting!



In 1854, Robert C. Campbell, a civil engineer, completed a detailed plan for a village to be called "Barrington Station," which then consisted of a farm house and a log barn located on 80 acres owned by Willard Stevens, and was bounded by what is now Hough Street, Lake-Cook Road, a line just to the east of Spring Street, and a line just south of Russell Street, which formed the nucleus of what is today the Village of Barrington. In 1863, approximately 300 residents of Barrington Station decided, in a referendum, to separate local and township powers, and this led, in 1865, to the Illinois Legislature's approval of the incorporation of the Village of Barrington.

On February 16, 2015, five years to the day after the Sesquicentennial Committee held its first meeting and the same date Barrington officially became incorporated in 1865, a 150th Celebration Program was held at the Village Hall. This program is available at www.Barrington150.com and is also being replayed on the Village's Channel 4.

In addition, the Committee has put together ways for us to remember, recount, and honor the years, eras, and people of our Village's history. On April 25th, a festive event is being planned to transform the downtown area to an historic atmosphere for people of all ages. Step back in time and enjoy lively music and dancing in the streets. Sample cornbread and other tasty treats of the era, or simply stroll among the Civil-War period atmosphere and admire the store windows and wares. With amazing entertainment and fun activities, there will be plenty of old time fanfare for the entire family. And when night falls, stay for the bonfire and share a memory or two with your neighbor. Raise a cup of cheer as Barrington salutes the past, celebrates the present, and looks toward the future. You won't want to miss this noteworthy moment in Barrington's history. Preventing Youth Drug & Alcohol Abuse

Since 2004, the Village of Barrington has been part of a community coalition called LEADS (Leaders Engaged Against Drugs) with others including Barrington Area Council of Governments (BACOG), local social service agencies, School District 220, the Lake County Health Department, area hospitals, and very dedicated parent volunteers. LEADS' mission is to reduce youth substance abuse and misuse.

Did you know that while the teenage brain can learn faster, absorb more information, and create deeper memories, it is also more prone to addictions (alcohol, drugs, video games, and cell phones). These addictions can develop faster than for adults and be stronger and more difficult to end.

LEADS employs various education and prevention strategies to help achieve a reduction in substance abuse among our youth. Perhaps, if you are a District 220 parent, you have seen the informative postcards which are part of the LEADS Time 2 Talk campaign? If you have gone to the LEADS website (www.barringtonleads.org), you may have reviewed the "Refusal Skills" section and "9 Ways Your Teen Can Say No to Alcohol."

On Tuesday evening, March 10 from 7:00 p.m. - 8:30 p.m. at the Barrington High School Auditorium, Barrington LEADS will present a program as part of "It's Time 2 Talk" campaign. Join LEADS as Brenda Nelson, BHS SAP Coordinator, a panel of BHS students and parents, and Lake County Judge Christopher Stride discuss local youth drug use data, strategies, and laws related to underage drinking.

I encourage you to attend this educational program whether you have teenage children, or grandchildren, or not. The issue is an important one for all of us and something we learn may not only be beneficial to us, but may help us influence good choices for future generations in our community.

Barrington Police Begin Carrying Narcan

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drug overdose is now the leading cause of injury death in the United States. As of 2010, opioids, such as heroin, account for approximately 75-80% of those deaths. The use and abuse of opioids, including heroin and prescription pain medications is on the rise. Heroin continues to be a national, state, and regional problem. According to the National Household Survey on Drug Use & Health, an average of 34,000 adolescents aged 12-17 initiate heroin use each year. A similar study found that 1 out of 8 high school seniors reported having used prescription opioids non-medically. Illinois is one of 16 states in which more people die of drug overdoses than motor vehicle crashes.

According to the Lake County Coroner's Office, there were 59 substance abuse deaths in 2013, with 43 cases considered opioid overdoses. The statistics resulted in the implementation of many strategies including the formation of the Lake County Opioid Initiative. This was followed by a multi-agency effort throughout Lake County to equip police officers with Narcan, also known as Naloxone. Narcan reverses the effects of opioids such as heroin, which bind to receptors on the brain and trigger narcotic effects on the body. This includes slower breathing and the lowering of blood pressure. Opiate overdoses can lead to death when these functions become too compromised. Giving Narcan to an individual that takes an excessive dose of opiates can save their life.

How does Narcan work? Narcan temporarily blocks the effects of opioids, giving the individual the chance to breathe. Narcan will take effect in 1 to 3 minutes. Narcan cannot be abused or cause an overdose, and side effects are extremely rare. "The decision to give our police officers the ability to administer Narcan is about saving lives," said Chief David Dorn. "As a police department, we wanted to be part of the county wide initiative that involves education and proactive drug prevention strategies as well. The primary goal is to prevent addiction and abuse of opiates, but we need to be prepared if an individual overdoses and the police department is in a position to prevent it," said Dorn.

It's Time to Weather the Storm

It is common knowledge that thunderstorms can produce rapidly changing and life threatening conditions, including lightning, heavy rains, flash floods, high winds, hail, and tornadoes. Because these types of storms have been in the forefront of news stories lately, our staff thought it would be a good idea to bring information about severe weather and our warning systems to your attention.

The Barrington Breakfast Rotary Club has graciously supplied the Village with ten lightning detection devices that are located at all local schools and parks. The local system is designed to predict a lightning strike within a defined area. When the conditions for a lightning strike exist, the system will give a 15-second blast on the horn cluster. If you hear the Lightning Prediction System activate, you should immediately seek shelter inside. Once the potential for a lightning strike has passed, the system will activate the horns for an all-clear signal - three short blasts - and the strobe light will go off. The lightning prediction system is the only local warning system that has an all-clear signal.

Only 1% of U.S. tornadoes reach "violent" intensity, yet those few result in 70% of all tornado deaths, as they did recently in Indiana and Missouri. Winds in these tornadoes can exceed 200 mph and can stay on the ground for an hour or more. If a tornado is spotted, take shelter in a substantial building, ditch, ravine, or other low spot (be cautious of flash flooding).

There are seven tornado warning sirens located within the Village. The steady tone is used to alert the public that a tornado has been sighted and is approaching the community. This tone will last three to five minutes. When the steady tone is heard during severe weather, you should immediately seek a place of shelter. After securing shelter, listen to cable TV, weather alert radios, or AM/FM radio stations for emergency information. There is NO all-clear siren tone. Listen to local radio or cable television for all-clear information. The outdoor warning sirens are tested the 1st Tuesday of every month at 10:00 a.m. If the steady tone is heard at any other time, it is a signal that an emergency is occurring within the community.

Watches and Warnings

Severe Thunderstorm Watch occurs when conditions are ideal for severe weather to develop.

Severe Thunderstorm Warning occurs when severe weather is imminent, seek shelter immediately.

Village Board Meeting Summary

At the Village Board meetings held on January 26th and February 9th, the Village Board took action on several items. The following is a summary of several of those items.

Hiring Seasonal Employees and Interns: The Village Board authorized the hiring of a seasonal position in the Public Works Forestry Division, and one intern for each of the Engineering & Building and Economic & Community Development Departments.

Motor Fuel Tax: The State of Illinois collects Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) and shares a portion of those collections with municipalities, on a per capita basis, for expenditures related to street improvement or maintenance. The Village Board authorized a standard resolution requesting the State to appropriate \$400,000 of MFT funds.

FOIA Officers: The Freedom of Information ACT (FOIA), requires the Village to designate one or more FOIA Officers. This resolution amended the list and designated FOIA officers, which can be found on the Village's website.

Vehicle Purchase: The 2015 budget approved the purchase of two new 2015 Ford Escapes for use by the Public Works Department. These vehicles will be used for errands, training, collecting samples, daily water checks and picking up needed parts.

Bullet Resistant Vests Purchase: With the assistance of a grant, the Police Department was granted approval to purchase bullet resistant vests to replace current vests that have outlived their usefulness.

Pension Funding Policy: The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 68 requires the Village establish a funding policy for its Police and Firefighter's Pension Funds. The Village Board approved a resolution establishing such a policy.

Staffing Analysis: In response to a recent resignation, the Village Board directed staff to study, analyze and report on the effectiveness and use of the rank and position of Assistant Fire Chief.

Affordable Housing Plan: The Barrington Village Code was amended to adopt an Affordable Housing Plan required by state legislation to outline the Village's plan for reaching the state goal of 10% affordable housing stock in the Village within the next five years. Currently 8.2% of housing in the Village is considered affordable under the state's criteria.

For those looking to park overnight, it is not allowed on any village street outside of the central business district, including residential areas and all public streets outside of the downtown area, from the hours of 1:00 a.m. – 6:00 a.m. Parking is not allowed in the central business district from 2:00 a.m. – 5:00 a.m.

There are several reasons the Village does not allow overnight parking without prior approval. The first being the need for the facilitation of street sweeping and snow removal. The Barrington Public Work's Department must have our streets clear in order to safely conduct these operations. Another reason for the prohibition allows for the Village to be a more attractive place with vehicles off the roadway and parked in driveways. Finally, when vehicles are parked or abandoned on the street at night, they can be targets of theft and vandalism. Having off-street parking allows our patrol officers and residents to easily identify vehicles that may not belong to a resident or a guest.

We understand that there are times when our residents will need to park on the street. Some of these reasons include a driveway being re-paved, the driver is a care provider, or you may have out of town guests. If you need to park overnight for these or any other reasons, please call ahead of time to (847) 304-3300. You will be asked for some basic vehicle information and, provided this isn't an abused occurrence, we will typically grant approval to park overnight.
