Village Report

State of the Village: By The Numbers

Public Works

Village News You Can Use

Fire Hydrant Flushing Scheduled

April 17 - April 29 (10:30 p.m. - 7:00 a.m.)

This includes the Village of Barrington, Paganica of Barrington Hills, and Braymore, Weatherstone, Glencrest, and Sanctuary of Inverness

May 2 - 4 (7:00 a.m. - 3:30 p.m.)

This includes Abbey Woods and Estates of Inverness Ridge

The Village conducts an annual flushing of the water distribution system to eliminate as much mineral content as possible from the domestic water supply. Fire hydrant flushing removes a considerable amount of loose mineral content and "settleable" solids that accumulate in the water supply system over a period of time. Fire hydrant flushing operations will be completed from April 12 through April 29 (as listed above, weather permitting). Customers may experience discoloration, low water pressure, and rusty water during flushing operations. These symptoms may occur the entire flushing period, even when flushing may not be in your immediate area. Although water may be discolored, it is safe to drink; however, until the water runs clear, it is advisable to avoid washing clothes, especially white fabrics. Any questions regarding this subject should be directed to the Public Works Department at (847) 381-7903.

Spring Chipper Schedule

Monday, May 9 - North of Main Street

Monday, May 16 - South of Main Street

Please have all the material out to the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your designated Monday morning. The Chipper will make only ONE pass through your neighborhood. Branches may be up to 10" in diameter and at least 4' in length. Stack branches neatly in a long low pile on the parkway, with the cut end facing the curb. Public Works crews cannot pick up material on private property. The following items cannot be picked up: root balls & stumps; building materials; anything with nails, wire or bolts; any materials placed in a box or garbage can; grass; leaves; or any materials other than wooded branch materials. Remember to utilize your Groot yard waste tote throughout the season.

Bike to School Day - May 4, 2016

Spring has arrived after a long winter and we have much to look forward to.

Bike to School Day is right around the corner! National Bike to School Day began in 2012 and Barrington has been a proud participant for the past 4 years. National Bike to School Day not only encourages children to ride their bikes to school, but learn about bike safety and promote a healthy lifestyle. This year Bike to School Day falls on Wednesday, May 4, 2016. This is a great way to kick start National Bike Month!

As we approach another bike riding season, here are a few bicycle safety and maintenance tips to help make bicycling more fun!

Just like driving a car, there are rules for riding your bike:

- Ride on the right side of the road or trail, because drivers expect, and look for, other traffic on the right.
- Obey traffic laws—signs and signals, including stoplights.
- Look back before turning or moving left.
- Ride single file if there are cars behind you.
- Use hand signals to let drivers know what you are going to do.
- Be careful of people walking — warn them you are coming.
- Look out for cars backing up — They may not see you.
- Don't ride too close to parked cars.
- Feel unsafe? You can always walk your bike.

Properly maintaining your bicycle is vital to riding safely. Check it yourself before each ride with the ABC Quick Check:

AIR — pinch the tires, they should be hard, with good air pressure.

BRAKES — make sure they work and aren't rubbing the tire.

CRANK/CHAIN — if there are problems with your gears or if the chain is loose, take it to a bike shop for repairs

QUICK — check "quick release levers" and other bolts to make sure they are tight.

Finally, your helmet should be worn the right way:

First, put on your helmet so it is level and snug — if it slides around, you need thicker pads.

EYES — you should see the very edge of your helmet when you look up past your eyebrow.

EARS — the straps should meet right under your ear to form a Y.

MOUTH — the strap should be loose enough so you can breathe and insert one or two fingers between the buckle and your skin, but tight enough that if you drop your jaw, you can feel the helmet pull down the top of your head.

Village Board Meeting Summary

At the Village Board meetings held February 22, 2016 and March 14, 2016, the Village Board took action on several items. The following is a summary of some of those items.

203 W Northwest Highway: The Village Board approved a Certificate of Approval for Pennino Family Dentistry to construct covered entryways over the front doors and add windows to the side and rear elevations.

1600 E. Main Street: The Village Board approved a Certificate of Approval and an amendment to an existing special use planned development for the Village Church of Barrington to construct a small addition to the front façade and a larger addition to the rear and side façade of the building.

220 S. Cook Street: The Village Board authorized a special use to allow for a massage establishment, Restorative Massage.

Hiring Employees: The Village Board authorized the hiring of two part-time Public Works employees.

Sanitary Sewer Overflow Inspections: In order to meet IEPA requirements, the Village authorized a contract with Gewalt Hamilton to investigate Sub Area 2.

NPDES Permit: Huff & Huff was contracted with provide a report regarding the method, time frame, and costs associated with reducing phosphorous in the wastewater treatment facility, per the NPDES permit.

Turf Maintenance: The Village Board contracted with the Alaniz Group to perform landscape maintenance in 2016.


Barrington Art Fest: The Village Board authorized the waiver of fees and use of Village rights-of-way for the annual art festival.

Sale of Village Owned Property: The Village Board has authorized the sale of property located at 322 N. Hough Street (the former ADCO site) to Monroe Residential Partners, LLC.

Pace Agreement: The Village Board entered into an Intergovernmental Agreement with both Barrington and Cuba Townships to reimburse for the local share subsidy for Village riders that use PACE dial-a-ride.





Know What's Below. Call Before You Dig.



You may be surprised by what's buried in your yard. That's because most electric, gas, water, sewer and telecommunications companies are delivering utility services underground. To avoid personal injury and damage to those underground lines, state law requires you to contact JULIE before any digging project, regardless of the project size or depth. Both the call and JULIE's services are free. You can prevent injury and avoid damage by following these four important steps:

- Call or Click before you dig
- Wait the required amount of time (two working days after your phone call)
- Respect the marks
- Dig with care

Notify JULIE if you are doing any of the following projects: decks and patios, trees or shrubs, swing sets, signs, fountains, tents, fences, mailbox posts, room additions, gardens, swimming pools, landscaping, etc.
