

400 S. Cook Street – Contributing



Located at 400 S. Cook Street is a two-story, gabled ell Folk dwelling built in 1862 according to the marker on the house. The house has a rebuilt continuous brick foundation, original weatherboard siding, a ca. 1970 exterior wall brick chimney and a gable roof of asphalt shingles. On the main (E) façade is a partial-width shed roof porch added ca. 1980, with chamfered wood columns on wood piers and a railing with square wood balusters. The main entrance has a ca. 1900, single-light glass and wood door. Windows are original, six-over-six rectangular double hung wood sash with original wood cornice surrounds and flanking wood plank shutters. On the south façade is a ca. 1940, one-story, gable roof wing with six-over-six double hung wood sash windows. On the rear façade is an original, one-story, frame ell with six-over-six double hung wood sash windows.



Located to the rear of the dwelling is a ca. 1920, frame, garage/shed with a gable roof, shiplap siding and a vertical board wood panel sliding track door. In the gable field is a wood sunburst pattern. **Contributing**
