

413 S. Cook Street – Contributing



At this location is a two-story gabled ell Colonial Revival and Eastlake-influenced dwelling built ca. 1880. The house has a continuous brick foundation, a gable roof of asphalt shingles, an interior brick chimney and an exterior of weatherboard siding. The main and south facades have a ca. 1920, gable roof wraparound sun porch with one-over-one fixed windows, a frame skirt wall and a single-light and three-wood panel door with a single-light enclosed transom above which is a projecting gable roof. The main entrance has an original, single-light and three-wood panel door. A secondary entrance on this façade has an original, wood panel door with a single-light transom. Windows are original one-over-one double hung wood sash with original, pedimented wood cornices and wood surrounds. On the north façade is a decorative diamond light window. In the gables are rectangular attic vents with pedimented wood cornices. On the south façade is a one-story, pent roof bay window with five, one-over-one double hung wood sash windows. The bay has fluted pilasters between the windows, a floral inscribed paneled cornice and an inset wood panel base.

To the rear of the dwelling is a ca. 1925, three-bay, rock-faced concrete block garage with a hipped roof, one-over-one double hung wood sash windows and two, gable roof dormers with a single-light window opening and s and original hinged glass and wood paneled garage doors. **Contributing**
