

418 S. Cook Street – Contributing



Located at 418 S. Cook Street is a two-story gabled ell Folk Victorian dwelling with Italianate-influences built ca. 1875. The house has a continuous brick foundation, a gable roof of asphalt shingles, an interior brick chimney and an exterior of aluminum siding. On the main (E) and south facades is an original, shed roof entry porch with original milled columns and square wood baluster railing. The main entrance has an original, glass and wood door. Windows are ca. 1980, one-over-one double hung wood sash with original, simple wood cornice surrounds with corner blocks and flanking added wood panel shutters. On the main façade is a ca. 1900, hipped roof bay window with three, one-over-one double hung wood sash windows, eave brackets, pellet molding and a base with wood inset panels. On the north façade is a ca. 1910, shed roof porch with original milled columns and railings. At the eaves are vergeboard panels with sawtooth valences.



On the south façade is a one-story, hipped roof porch enclosed ca. 1960 for use as a sunroom with a set of five, one-over-one double hung wood sash windows. Also on the south façade are two, slightly projecting bays both with a pent roof and a paired set of windows beneath which is a wood inset panel. In the gable fields are one-light fixed windows with simple wood cornice surrounds with corner blocks and flanking shutters.
