

522 S. Cook Street – Contributing



Located at 522 S. Cook Street is a one- and one-half story, frame, Dutch Colonial Revival-influenced dwelling built ca. 1910. The side-gabled plan has a front cross-gable. The dwelling has a stucco-covered continuous brick foundation, a gambrel roof of asphalt shingles with gable returns and an exterior of weatherboard siding. The main entrance has an original six-panel door with a ca. 1950, wood frame surround with Doric-pilasters and a wood cornice. Windows are original six-over-six and four-over-four double hung wood sash. In the gable field of the main façade are ca. 1980, ten-light casement windows with wood cornice surrounds and flanking louvered shutters. On the main façade is a ca. 1980 hipped roof bay window with a central paired set of four-over-four double hung wood sash windows flanked by four-over-four double hung wood sash windows on a tongue and groove wood panel base. On the rear façade is an original, single-story, gable roof wing with a fifteen-light glass and wood door.

Banked into the ground in front of the house is a ca. 1980, garage with wood lattice siding and an overhead metal panel track door. **Noncontributing**
