

120 Coolidge Avenue – Contributing



This is a one and one-half story gabled ell Folk house with French Countryside influence, built ca. 1920. The house has a clipped gable roof of asphalt shingles. The projecting bay on the main (S) façade has an original, small inset porch on its east elevation which was remodeled in the late 20th century with the addition of a milled railing and frieze. The dwelling has an exterior of weatherboard siding and a continuous poured concrete foundation. Windows are original, eight-light wood casement design. On the west elevation are two, ca. 1980, large shed roof dormers. The dormers are a polygonal bay design with three, single-light fixed windows. Between the two dormers is a newly constructed large metal flue.



To the rear of the dwelling is an original, frame, one-bay garage with a clipped front gable roof of asphalt shingles, an exterior of vinyl siding, a pedestrian door with a canvas canopy adjacent to a ca. 1990 large overhead track metal door on the main façade.
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
