### ARC 10-13 – first story room addition

Located at 300 S. Grove Avenue is a two-story, frame, gabled ell Folk dwelling built ca. 1890. The house has a continuous stone foundation, a gable roof of asphalt shingles, an interior central brick flue and an exterior of vinyl siding. On the main (E) façade is a ca. 1930, enclosed central gable roof entry vestibule that replaced a partial-width porch. The entry vestibule has an exterior of vinyl siding, poured concrete steps, wrought iron handrails and two-over-two double hung wood sash windows. The main entrance retains its original, two-light and four-wood panel door with an aluminum surround. On the north façade is a hipped roof bay window with a twelve-light picture window flanked by six-light fixed vinyl windows supported by heavy wood brackets. On the south façade is a thirty-five-light picture window flanked by ten-light windows with a poured concrete base. On the rear façade is an original gable roof wing with six-over-six wood sash windows and vinyl surrounds and an enclosed rear porch.



Attached to the rear façade of the dwelling via a single-story enclosed breezeway is a ca. 1980, one-bay, slanting front gable garage with eight-light vinyl windows and a, horizontal metal panel overhead track door. **Noncontributing**
