

625 S. Grove Avenue – Contributing



At this location is a two-story, frame, gabled ell Folk dwelling built ca. 1911 and remodeled into its current appearance during the late 1970s and early 1980s. The house has a brick foundation, a gable roof of asphalt shingles, an interior metal flue and an exterior of aluminum siding. On the main (W) and south elevations is a ca. 1980, hipped roof, wraparound porch with milled wood posts, railing and valence. The main entrance has a ca. 1980, wood panel door flanked by single-light and wood panel sidelights. Windows are primarily ca. 1980, replacement, paired three-light casement glass and wood design with two-light transoms and flanking shutters. On the second story, the main façade has a ca. 1980, circular stained glass window. On the south elevation is a ca. 1980, one-and one-half story, frame, shed roof addition with a secondary entrance on its west façade which leads to the wraparound porch. The secondary entrance has a ca. 1980, single-light glass and aluminum door. At the roofline on the addition is a gable roof dormer. In the gable field on the main façade are wood shingles in scallop and diamond patterns.



At the rear is an original, one-and one-half-story, single-bay, frame garage with a gable front roof of asphalt shingles with a metal weathervane at the ridgeline, full-width band of wood birdhouses, a circular clock in the gable field, an exterior of aluminum siding and a metal panel overhead track door. **Contributing**
