

212 W. Lincoln Avenue – Contributing



Located at 212 W. Lincoln Avenue is a one- and one-half-story, frame, gabled ell Folk Victorian dwelling built ca. 1880. The house has a gable roof of wood shingles, a brick foundation and a weatherboard exterior. On the main (S) elevation is a partial-width shed roof porch set within the ell and supported by replacement milled wood posts and wood railing. The main entrance has an original, single-light glass and wood door. Windows are original, one-over-one double hung wood sash. Windows and doors have wood surrounds with corner blocks and saw tooth trim beneath a simple wood cornice. The first floor of the main façade has a large, projecting, hipped roof bay with a fixed, single-light window above which is a multi-light transom supported by large wood brackets. On the west elevation is a ca. 1955, frame, single-story addition with a side gable roof, an exterior brick chimney and sliding glass doors on its west facade. On the rear façade of the dwelling is an original wing. Attached to this original rear wing is another single-story addition of its western façade. Surrounding the house and property is a wood post and wood picket fence painted beige to match the house.



To the rear of the dwelling is an original, two-bay carriage house converted into a garage ca. 1980. The garage has a side gable roof of wood shingles, a weatherboard exterior and two, six-sectioned, two-light fixed glass and vertical board wood doors. At the roofline is a small gable roof wall dormer with a four-light, fixed window. Also on the property is an original, frame storage building reconstructed ca. 1970.

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
