Located at 228 W. Lincoln Avenue is a two-and-one-half-story, frame side-gabled Colonial Revival dwelling built ca. 1930, with a roof of asphalt shingles, a poured concrete and brick foundation, an exterior end stone chimney and an exterior of aluminum siding. On the main (S) façade is the recessed main entrance with an original, six-light glass and wood panel door with a wood box panel frame. Flanking the entrance are fluted pilasters and above is an arched, wood pediment with a sunburst pattern. The first floor of the main façade has a large, original,

twenty-light picture window flanked by four-over-four double hung wood sash windows above which is a scalloped wood cornice and slightly flared hipped roof hood beneath which is a canvas awning. Other windows in the dwelling are original, six-over-six double hung wood sash with canvas awnings. A secondary entrance on the west elevation has an original, sixlight glass and wood door. On the northwest corner of the dwelling is a ca. 1940, small flat roof addition.

At the rear of the dwelling is an original, frame, two-bay garage with a steeply-pitched gable front roof, an exterior of clapboard siding and two, sixteen-wood panel overhead track garage doors. In the gable field are decorative shingles and a square, six-light fixed window. Contributing
