

239 W. Lincoln Avenue – Contributing



ARC 08-10 – construct a two-story rear addition as well as exterior modifications to the front façade

Located at 239 W. Lincoln Avenue is a two-story gable front Folk dwelling built ca. 1910. The house has an exterior of masonite siding, a continuous foundation of rock-faced concrete block, a flanged gable roof of asphalt shingles and an interior brick chimney. On the main (N) façade is a full-width, single-story porch enclosed ca. 1960 for a sunroom with four-over-four double hung wood sash windows, masonite shingle siding, a large picture window with a three-light transom and flanked by four-over-four double hung wood sash windows. The main entrance has a wood panel door with a simple wood cornice surround above which is a small projecting gable over a concrete stoop with ca. 1980 wrought iron railings. Windows are ca. 1960, one-over-one rectangular double hung wood sash with wood surrounds and flanking wood shutters on the main façade. A louvered triangular metal attic vent is in the apex of the gable field.



Of the northwest corner of the dwelling is a ca. 1960, single-bay, frame garage with a hipped roof of asphalt shingles, an exterior of masonite siding and a metal panel overhead track door. **Noncontributing**
